



Students participate in a multitude of service projects, serving their parishes, schools, communities, and the Diocese of San Juan de la Maguana, our sister diocese in the Dominican Republic.





The faith-centered environment of our Catholic schools is at the heart of what sets us apart from other educational institutions. Through a solid religious curriculum, taught by certified teachers with catechist training and a focus on service to others, our students gain a deep understanding of Christ and our Catholic faith. They grow in their love and knowledge of Christ through daily prayer, as well as in the regular celebration of Mass and seasonal liturgical prayer services and events.



Throughout the school year, our school communities collect numerous items — from food to clothing to personal items that benefit those less fortunate locally and worldwide. For example (above), Edwin Disang, a native of Mmadinare, Botswana and now girl's soccer coach at Melbourne Central Catholic High School, spearheaded a uniform and equipment drive that benefitted six primary school teams from his hometown. Close to 80 soccer balls, cones, training vests and uniforms were sent. Below, students from Sacred Heart Catholic School show some of the food items they collected for the local food bank.



Catholic schools help students discover their God-given gifts and talents and teach them to use their gifts in service to others. It is in sharing our gifts with others that we truly show gratitude to God.



Our faculty and administrators lead by example. Every year, educators travel to our sister diocese in the Dominican Republic either leading a group of high school missionaries or serving on education missions. While the pandemic thwarted late year missions, a few educators, such as Nathan Nadeau, principal at St. Charles Borromeo Catholic School, were able to make mission trips earlier in the year. Nadeau made his first trip to the Dominican Republic in Summer 2019, and assisted in getting two SMARTBoards for schools in Los Frios, through the goodwill of a donor and in sharing a portion of the school's fundraising efforts.



Research shows that Catholic school graduates are more committed to service as adults. Three Bishop Moore Catholic High School Class of 2019 graduates exemplify this notion. Instead of heading off to college or the military, James Nguyen, Jacob Carbonelle and Daniel Gomez, embarked on a mission to improve the lives of the children and adults of the Thiên Bình Orphanage, a community located on the outskirts of Ho Chi Min City in Vietnam and run by a group of 21 religious sisters. The three young men spent up to a year working the land, demolishing and rebuilding buildings damaged by storms, teaching children English, and maintaining the compound and gardens.





Every year, the Office of Catholic Schools presents the St. Teresa of Calcutta Award to one PreK-8 school and one high school in recognition for service



While there were some bumps in the road and a bit of anxiety along the way, all in all, our communities met the challenge, which enabled our students to remain on track in their grade levels, as they continued to learn and grow in their love of Jesus from home.



Bishop Moore breaks ground on the Moore Center for Excellence

Bishop John Noonan blessed the ground for the new Moore Center for Excellence on the Bishop Moore Catholic High School campus on January 27 before Tom Doyle, president, and Scott Brogan, principal, joined him in breaking ground for the new building.

Located by the school's playing fields, the 28,000 square foot, two-story, state-of-the-art facility will feature a new training room, locker rooms, as well as classrooms and meeting rooms. In addition, the Moore Center will have conference space, a catering kitchen, and a store where fans can stock up on Bishop Moore merchandise. There will also be a reception hall with balconies overlooking the sports fields and a tunnel so student athletes can run onto the field.

The project would not be possible without the many donors who came up with more than \$3 million in funding. The Moore Center for Excellence is scheduled to be complete by late 2020.

All faculty were trained in "Youth Mental First Aid" by the end of the 2019-2020 academic year. Presented by counselors from Catholic Charities, the workshop taught our educators how to identify early warning signs of mental health issues in our students and to intervene early with assistance.

School administrators, key staff, and the Office of Catholic Schools staff received the training in 2018-2019.

The program is part of our continuing effort to improve safety on our campuses as well serve the needs of our children.



As part of its commitment to ensure the safety and well-being of all students in Catholic schools in the diocese, the Office of Catholic Schools introduced a social media seminar geared just for parents. "Unintended Consequences: The Hidden Impact of Growing Up Digitally" taught parents about the hidden impact of digital exposure on children's physical and mental development.

Created and presented by Tami Murphy, a middle responsibility, internet safety, and adolescent school teacher at Holy Family Catholic School, the seminar covered social media, brain

development, grooming, human trafficking, safety measures, and "the good, the bad, and the ugly" of popular social media apps.

Throughout her teaching career, Murphy has advocated for children as an educator. instructional coach, and social media director. Seminar explores the hidden dangers of social media. She said her keen interest in social media brain development surged when her children were in middle school.

"The social media world in which our children are growing up in is vastly different than the world many parents knew as children," Murphy said. "It poses both possibilities and perils new and unique to this generation. We're starting to see how these platforms affect learning and scientific studies are giving us more insight on the impact of social media on young, developing minds."



St. Joseph Academy merges with Polk Catholic schools

On May 22, 2020, St. Joseph Academy in Lakeland announced that it will merge with nearby Catholic schools at the end of the 2019-2020 school year. Despite herculean efforts to save the school, even considering moving back to its original building on Lemon Street, it was simply not feasible.

"What we could not have imagined was the COVID-19 pandemic and its effect upon our world in such a short time," said Father Tim LaBo, pastor of St. Joseph Catholic Church in Lakeland. "Our economy has changed dramatically. Many families have been out of work, businesses are struggling to stay open, and many of our parishioners have requested financial assistance. These factors have had a serious impact on reenrollment numbers."

The Office of Catholic Schools' staff assisted families in answering questions and integrating them into St. Joseph Catholic School in Winter Haven and Resurrection Catholic School, St. Anthony Catholic School, and Neumann Early Learning Academy, all in Lakeland.

In the end, 90% of our SIA families remained in our Catholic school system.



We are pleased to announce that the parent, or member of the public to FortifyFL app is LIVE and available to all of our school communities. Created in response to the Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School shooting in Parkland, FL 2018, the app allows any student, educator,

report school safety concerns directly to law enforcement and school administrators anonymously and easily. It is another measure we are taking to ensure the safety of our communities.

Emergency Preparedness Enhanced

Because we believe a uniform, planned, and practiced response to any incident is the foundation of a safe school, we continued to improve security on our campuses throughout the year.

With the focus on "Plan. Prepare. Practice," we rolled out of the Standard Response Protocols (SRP), an actionbased, flexible, and easy-to-learn plan of organized tactics for response to weather events, fires, accidents, intruders, and other threats to student safety, to all of our school communities.

The protocols laid out a uniform language in response to emergencies. Our verbiage was also shared with emergency response teams within our various cities and communities.

As part of our efforts, all schools received SRP posters in English and Spanish to display in every classroom and throughout their buildings.

Teachers also received a Standard Response Protocol Emergency flip chart, and parents were given a reference guide.



Topics covered in regional emergency trainings for teachers:

- 1. Foster engaging relationships in our school community.
- 2. Nurturing a supportive culture of mutual respect.
- 3. Building resiliency in our students so they become better responding to adverse situations.
- 4. Responding to emergencies using the common language of SRP.

Since the onset of the COVID-19 virus, the Office of Catholic Schools has and continues to work closely with the CDC, state, county, and local health departments to ensure that all health and safety, as well as all cleaning protocols are being implemented to ensure the well-being of our communities.



San Pedro Center responds to COVID crisis

In the wake of the rising anxiety of the international pandemic, people sought solace and spiritual guidance, and the staff at San Pedro responded by creating three new virtual programs that addressed the spiritual and emotional needs of the faithful. The programs included weekly events, including Bible studies and reflections; various self-paced

Forty-one families in the remote community of La Cueva in our sister diocese, San Juan de la Maguana, Dominican Republic, will soon have a safer place to call home, thanks to a generous grant from the **Ruckstuhl Foundation** (for 40 of the homes) and one anonymous donor (one home). Most families live in ramshackle homes that are vulnerable against the tropical storms that rip across the country. Once the houses are complete, these families will have a sturdy block house to call home. All future homeowners are assisting in the construction of their homes.

As of late 2020, the exterior block walls have been erected in the first 12 houses. When these 12 houses have exterior walls, the foundation of three more houses will be worked on, and so on. The roofs will be built once a group of construction missioners gets the opportunity to travel to the Dominican Republic to work with the locals. The pandemic has hampered mission efforts since Spring.


The Mission Office is trying to help these families get a small four-burner gas stove or table top stove so they are able to cook inside their homes. They are also trying to get solar panels for these new houses.

Additional Ongoing Projects:



Multi Community Water project: Locals started digging the trenches in early 2020. The water comes from a spring found on a mountain and will provide running water to homes in approximately nine villages.


